

When God's sovereignty doesn't make sense, remember:

(I) God is working for your "good"

Romans 8: 28 And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.

Jeremiah 29: II For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. 12 Then you will call on me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you. You can be disciplined without committing a sin (cf.Hebrews 5:8 "Jesus learned obedience...")

When God's sovereignty doesn't make sense, remember:

(2) You may think you're suffering senselessly but it always has a higher purpose.

Peter 1: 6 In all this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. 7 These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire—may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed.

You personally may lose but you're on the winning team!

When God's sovereignty doesn't make sense, remember:

(3) God's sovereignty (even judgment) is a sign of His intimate involvement.

Psalm 23: Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.

When God's sovereignty doesn't make sense, remember:

(4) Not knowing is never a bad place to be.

Job 38: Then the Lord spoke to Job out of the storm. He said:

- 2 "Who is this that obscures my plans with words without knowledge?
- 3 Brace yourself like a man; I will question you, and you shall answer me.
- 4 "Where were you when...

Romans 9: 14 What then shall we say? Is God unjust? Not at all! 15 For he says to Moses, "I will have mercy on whom I have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I have compassion."

16 It does not, therefore, depend on human desire or effort, but on God's mercy.

Saul got what he deserved.

David did not get what he deserved.

The question is not, "Why do bad things happen to good people?"

But, "Why do good things happen to bad people?"

Don't rob people of their ignorance of God's will with trite answers. Tell them about a God who knows what it means to suffer and suffer loss.

One last thought: Don't be a "Superstitious Christian"
